Folklifetraditions, which are not necessarily old, that are passed on informally (by word of mouth, observation, and imitation) over time and through space. Folklore is usually anonymous. Folklore can have:  • motifs - patterns that stay the same within a tradition.  • variants - a variation within a tradition, a different version that develops as it is passed on.

Cultural processes -culture and knowledge passed on through folk, popular, or elite cultural modes.
folk culture culture and knowledge passed on over time informally, by word of mouth, imitation, and observation
<ul> <li>popular culture culture and knowledge passed on through mass media, magazines, television, radio, Internet.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>elite culture the culture and knowledge handed down, learned, and taught officially through formal institutions such as schools, colleges, museums, and conservatories as opposed to <u>folk</u> or <u>popular culture</u>.</li> </ul>
