 Presented as true accounts Usually told in first person More and more unusual features are added to the story Celebrate the magical aspects of nature Popular among all-male groups Used to test and initiate newcomers 	 Contemporary themes, situations May or may not be true Told by males and females of all ages Express anxieties about rapidly changing society Have plausible beginnings, but grow more and more fantastic Often found on the Internet

 Local heroes and characters who have made their mark on Louisiana Tell about specific local characters, e.g., the Longs, Jean Lafitte Sometimes in verse or song Actual events with fictitious characters History and supernatural meets, as in "buried treasure" legends 	 Usually feature a sly animal or human character Trickster serves as a hero for the powerless Hero is sometimes amoral or immoral Hero does not always win
