By examining domestic work, skills, and crafts, you uncover **traditional learning** in your own home and daily life. You can identify experts <u>at</u> home and in the <u>region</u> whose skills contribute to <u>building</u> family life and community. <u>Domestic</u> crafts vary from home to <u>home</u> and regionally, and you will study domestic <u>crafts</u> around the state. You <u>will</u> examine how gender and <u>age</u> relate to domestic work <u>and</u> analyze where you <u>fit</u> in the scheme of work around the home.

Work <u>around</u> the home is an <u>integral</u> part of domestic and <u>family</u> folklife, conveying skills, values, <u>ways</u> of behaving, responsibility, and <u>connectedness</u>. Gender and age often <u>play</u> a big role in assignment <u>of</u> tasks and responsibilities. Households <u>harbor</u> master craftspeople, cooks, repair <u>experts</u>, caregivers, musicians, or gardeners. <u>Children</u> learn traditionally by observation <u>and</u> imitation from everyone in <u>their</u> households. Some domestic skills <u>are</u> overlooked as areas of expertise <u>or</u> dismissed as "women's work" <u>vet</u> require practice, patience, and <u>skill</u>, whether baking biscuits, building a <u>shed</u>, tatting lace, or managing a <u>scout</u> troop. As in work <u>outside</u> the home, elements of <u>play</u> enter domestic work as well. <u>Quilting</u> can be entertaining as <u>well</u> as useful; building something <u>by</u> hand is satisfying; telling <u>stories</u> while doing household chores <u>makes</u> the work go faster; <u>planning</u> and tending a garden <u>offers</u> year-round aesthetic and practical <u>rewards</u>.
